- Present students with curriculum that uses play and imagination to encourage expression and discovery

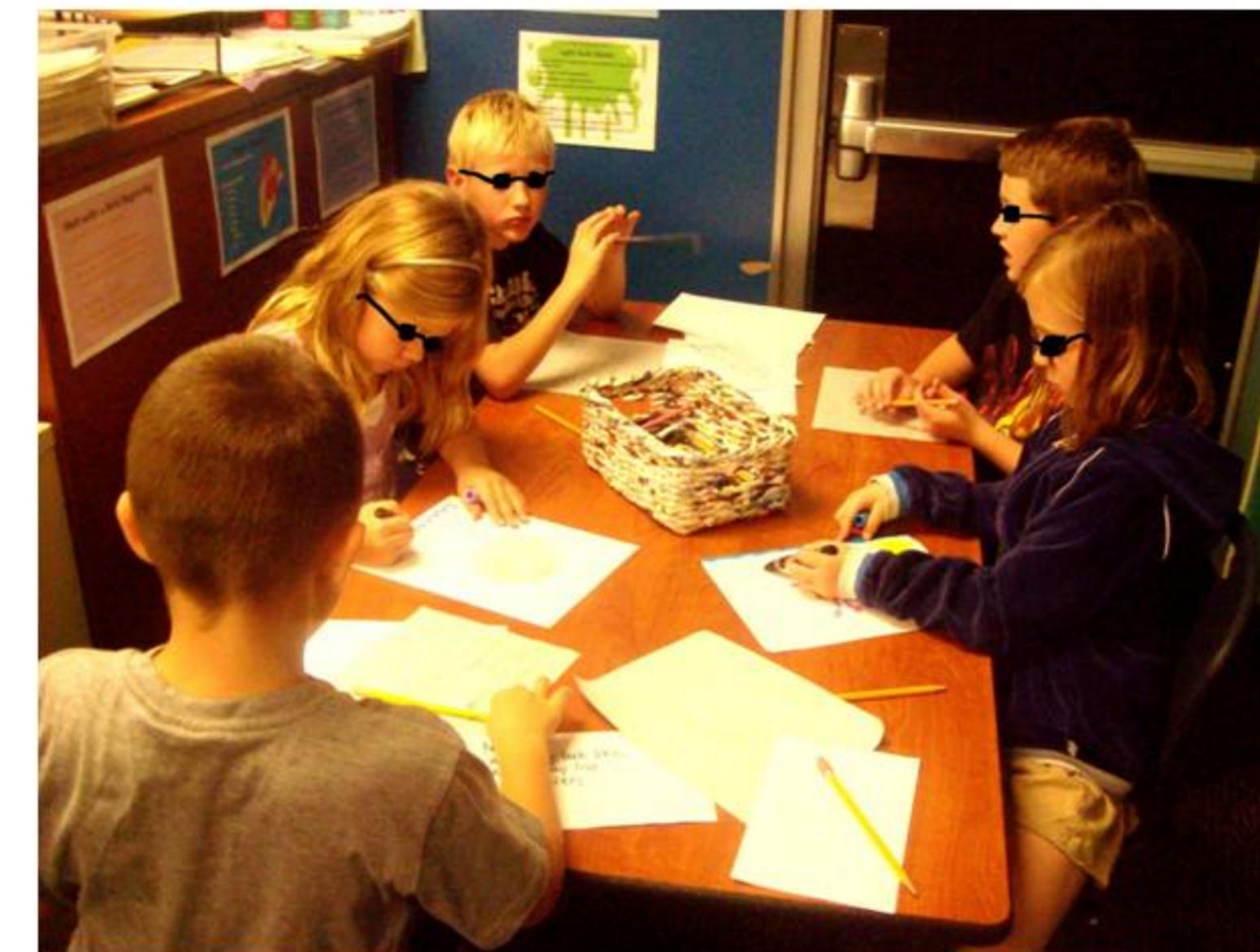
Literature Review

The Benefits of a Creative Writer's Workshop

- Critical thinking skills are developed
- Students develop a higher level of awareness in their everyday lives
- Multiple learning styles and intelligences are satisfied

The Benefits of Integrating the Arts into Writing

- *Music* – improves mathematic reasoning, and promotes literacy
- *Drama* – enhances comprehension and encourages peer collaboration
- *Visual Arts* – aids students in interpreting text and enhances reading abilities



Results

While conducting this teacher research, I found:

- Unmotivated students can become motivated
- Students can find pride and assume responsibility in their work
- Students who struggle academically find success when they are given the opportunity to demonstrate their learning through multiple mediums of expression
- Students can learn how to "think" and approach other areas of curriculum with a creativity
- The arts can help students experience and therefore more deeply understand concepts in all curricular areas
- Writing is a one-on-one working experience and "workshopping" lessons allows for the teacher to better meet the needs of all students
