# Robert S. Eckley

Robert S. Eckley, 90, died at 2:10 a.m. on Sunday, April 15 at his home after a four year battle with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (commonly known as ALS or Lou Gehrig's disease).

A memorial service will be held in Evelyn Chapel on Illinois Wesleyan's campus, Thursday, April 19 at 11 a.m. Immediately following the memorial service, the family will be available to visit at the Celebration of Life luncheon in the Young Main Lounge of the Memorial Center.

President Emeritus of Illinois Wesleyan University, Eckley enjoyed a dual career in higher education and business. Born on September 4, 1921, in Kankakee, Illinois, he was the son of George A. and Mary Spence Eckley.

Eckley was elected president of Illinois Wesleyan in 1968 and served 18 years, longer than any other president in the University's history. Chief emphases during his administration were the strengthening of the academic and financial aspects of the University. The proportion of faculty holding doctoral degrees almost doubled during his tenure, and those within the Liberal Arts College rose substantially. The endowment fund was increased to seven times its 1968 value. Campus beautification was fostered, and two awards were made to the University by the Bloomington Citizens Beautification Committee.

The campus size was nearly doubled and the Alice Millar Fine Arts Center, Dodds Hall, Evelyn Chapel, and Fort Natatorium were added. Eckley worked closely with architect Ben Weese of Chicago in the design of the chapel, which attracted national attention (*Architecture* magazine, AIA, cover and stories) and became a focal point for the campus.

Curricular change was facilitated by several foundation grants and pointed toward improved integration of liberal and professional learning in business, the health sciences, fine arts, and teaching.

While president and following his retirement, Eckley taught courses in international business and portfolio management over three decades. Following retirement, he was engaged in consulting in both K-12 and higher education.

Before joining Illinois Wesleyan, Eckley served for 14 years at Caterpillar in Peoria, where his responsibilities included economic research, pricing, production scheduling, and product control. Appointed in 1954, he was the first professional economist employed by Caterpillar, where he established the business economics department. He assisted Caterpillar in promoting access to foreign markets and to employment stability. Earlier, he had taught economics at Harvard and the University of Kansas and served as the senior industrial economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. Immediately after retiring from IWU, he spent a year as visiting fellow in economics at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C.

During World War II, he was an engineering officer in the U.S. Coast Guard for three years, and served on the Navy vessel, USS Davenport, in the North Atlantic on convoy escort and weather patrol duty.

He also served as a director of State Farm Insurance Companies for 27 years and a board member of Central Illinois Public Service Company (a predecessor of Ameren) for 21 years. He was a board member of the McLean County Bank (now part of Regions Bank), Turbodyne Corporation of Minneapolis, and the Methodist Medical Center of Peoria. Since retirement, he served as a board member and president of the Abraham Lincoln Association in Springfield (2002-04), the David Davis Mansion Foundation (1994-96), and member of the board of the McLean County Historical Society. Earlier he was president of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church, first vice-president of the Illinois Council of Churches, president of the Bradley United Christian Foundation, and a member of the Peoria Mayor's Commission on Human Relations.

Recognized as an individual who significantly contributed to the mission of the Abraham Lincoln Association (ALA), Eckley was a recipient of the Logan Hay Medal for his scholarly work and devotion to the ideals of the association. The medal is awarded infrequently and is the highest honor given by the ALA.

Eckley was a graduate of Bradley University, received an MBA degree from the University of Minnesota, and a masters' and PhD in economics from Harvard University. He is the author of five books, including *Global Competition in Capital Goods*, 1991, and *Abraham Lincoln's Forgotten Friend, Leonard Swett*, 2012, and the author of articles published in the *Harvard Business Review*, *The American Economic Review*, *The Brookings Review*, *The Journal of the Illinois State Historical Society*, and the *Journal of the Abraham Lincoln Association*. He was a member of the American Economic Association, the American Statistical Association, and the National Association of Business Economists.

As a graduate student at Minnesota, he had the Nobel laureate in economics, George Stigler (1982), as a professor, and while teaching at Kansas, he had another future recipient of the Nobel Prize, Vernon Smith (2002), as a student in American economic history. For his doctoral examination at Harvard, Joseph A. Schumpeter (1883-1950), the famous Austrian-American economist, served as chairman.

He is survived by his wife of 65 years, Nell Mann Eckley and four children: Paul Nelson (Penelope Diane) Eckley, Normal, Ill., Robert George Eckley (Mary Marta Anderson), St. Louis, Mo., Jane Ann Lennon (David Gartshore), Oakland, Calif., and Rebecca Helen (Kenneth) Melchert, Neenah, Wis. He has five grandchildren: Tessa, Normal, William, St. Louis, Mo. and Adriane, John, and Alex, Neenah, Wis.

He is preceded in death by one older brother, Carson, at the age of 10.
