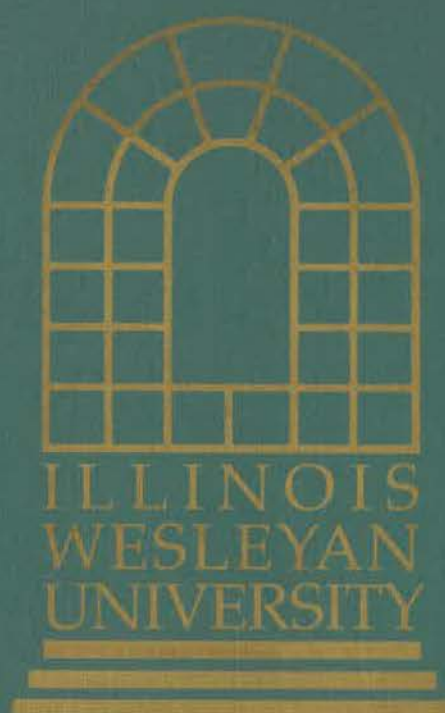

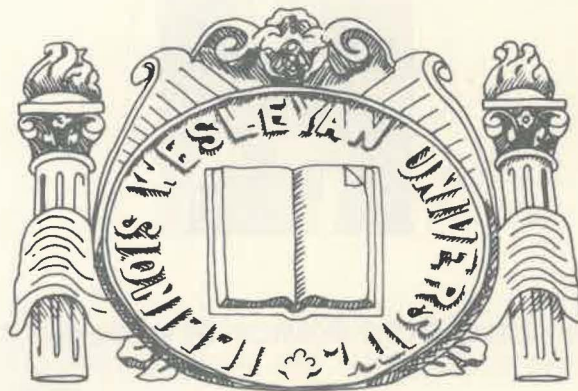

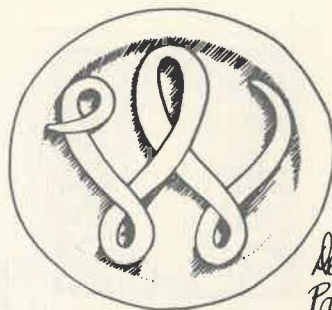
Today Illinois Wesleyan celebrates the inauguration of its seventeenth President since its founding one hundred and thirty-nine years ago.

Dr. Minor Myers, jr., 47, is a scholar and teacher, author and administrator, political philosopher and historian. Born in Akron, Ohio, he was educated at Carleton College, where he earned his baccalaureate in 1964. After a year of postgraduate study at Duke University, he went on to Princeton University which awarded him the master of arts (1967) and doctor of philosophy (1972) degrees in politics and political philosophy.

He comes to the Illinois Wesleyan presidency following a five-year tenure at Hobart and William Smith Colleges, Geneva, New York, where he was Provost and Dean of the Faculty as well as Professor of Political Science. As chief academic officer of the two coordinate colleges, Myers was responsible for long range planning, the instructional budget, curriculum and related academic activities.

Colleagues at the upstate New York institution described his extraordinary level of energy and brilliant mind, his speaking ability and sustaining wit, and his understanding of the complexities of a liberal arts college.

Myers began his academic career in 1968 at Connecticut College in New London, Connecticut, as instructor in government, progressing quickly through the ranks to full professor and departmental chairman. In 1981-82 he spent a sabbatical year in academic administration at Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island, as a Fellow of the American Council on Education, working with the President and Dean of the College on curricular development, fiscal management, development, admission trends and other issues in higher education administration.

Returning to the college, he became administrative assistant to the President and Dean of the Faculty before leaving in 1984 to accept the position at Hobart and William Smith Colleges.

The new president of Illinois Wesleyan has an ardent interest in the eighteenth century, with particular focus on American furniture, early musical instruments, books and publishing, higher education during the American colonial period, and the French Revolution.

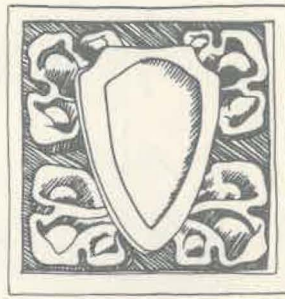
He has served as chairman of the Lyman Allyn Museum in New London, Connecticut, as adviser to the Yale University's Numismatic Collection and as a member of the advisory board of the Princeton University Chapel.

His published books include a history of the Calvary Episcopal Church of Stonington, Connecticut, and *Liberty Without Anarchy: A History of the Society of the Cincinnati*. He co-authored a history of the Princeton Graduate School, a *Documentary History of American Interiors from the Colonial Era to 1915*, and *New London County Furniture*. He is currently at work on three manuscripts: *Nature's Aristocrats: College Graduates and the New Republic*, *A Dictionary of American Academics before 1830*, and *An Evening with Peter Pelham: An American Harpsichord Manuscript of 1744*.

His articles range from a scholarly look at the history of baseball in upper New York state to notes on crime and punishment in colonial Connecticut, from an investigation of an obscure Polish medal refused by George Washington to a discussion of the migration of the blockfront style of furniture in New England.

Dr. Myers lists his hobbies as collecting eighteenth century books, numismatics, college publications and music. He enjoys playing the harpsichord and piano and, occasionally, tennis.

He married Ellen Achin, an alumna of Connecticut College, who is a junior high school teacher of French. They are parents of two sons, Minor III, age 11, and Joffre, age 8.

History of Illinois Wesleyan University

The University was founded in 1850 by thirty men of diverse backgrounds, religious denominations and occupations, all eager to establish "an Institution of Collegiate grade" on the Illinois prairie. The Founding Fathers, all church and community leaders, included attorneys, physicians, merchants and manufacturers, farmers and preachers. Twelve of the signers of IWU's "birth certificate" were ordained Methodist ministers; the others included Roman Catholics, Congregationalists, Quakers, and Presbyterians.

The original agreement named the school "Illinois University," but later "Wesleyan" was inserted to honor John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. By 1856, the University came under the sponsorship of two Central Illinois Conferences of the Methodist Church, although the Founders had stipulated in the charter of incorporation that "the profession of any particular religious faith shall not be required of those who become students." Today the University cherishes its church-related heritage and ecumenical values.

Because public schools had not yet been established on the prairie as early as the mid-nineteenth century, the first classes to open at IWU were for preparatory students. By 1851, the year after its founding, Wesleyan was offering college classes to seven young men (the admission of women was debated by the trustees and rejected as "inexpedient" at that time) and classes were held in the basement of the Methodist Church in Bloomington.

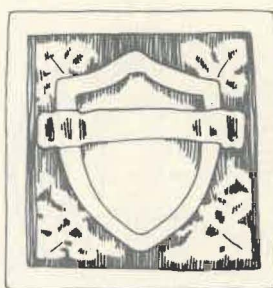
The central part of the campus was purchased in 1854 on the site of Phoenix Nursery. North Hall, the first building and destined to serve the University for one hundred and ten years, was completed in 1856. The main "college edifice" was built in 1871 and later named Hedding Hall. After a calamitous fire in 1943, its ground floor was roofed over and renamed Duration Hall.

Black students were admitted in 1867, and the first black graduate received his degree in 1881. Women were finally accepted for admission in 1870.

Three years later, in 1873, Illinois Wesleyan opened its highly regarded School of Law. The first fine arts school was created in 1879 when the University absorbed a downtown school of music. In 1906 the College of Liberal Arts was formed and ten years later the University was fully accredited by the North Central Association.

A 1924 affiliation with the Brokaw Hospital school of nursing led to the formation of a four-year professional School of Nursing at IWU in 1959. In the previous decade, the professional School of Art (1946) and School of Drama (1947) joined with the School of Music to create the College of Fine Arts.

In the decade of the 1960's, the Old North Hall was razed to make way for Sheean Library (1966) and Evans Observatory was dedicated in the presence of the astronauts of Apollo 8 (1969). Alice Millar Center for the Fine Arts opened in 1972; Evelyn Chapel

was completed in 1984 and Fort Natatorium in 1988. Three years ago, Kemp Hall/International House was opened as a residential and cultural center to prepare its students for global citizenship. Currently, Buck Memorial Library is being renovated for use as the Interactive Learning Center with the capability to offer computer-aided instruction and linkage with all parts of the world.

The next focus will be on the construction and endowment of facilities for science and athletics.

Student quality has been rising steadily in recent years as the University becomes more selective in its admission standards. Last year, Illinois Wesleyan was ranked second in the U.S. among small comprehensive institutions by a national news magazine. College guides and other evaluators have also placed IWU among the best in the nation.

Wesleyan's endowment, always an indicator of high quality, is now at \$60 million, among the top ten percent in endowment size among the more than 700 liberal arts colleges in the U.S.

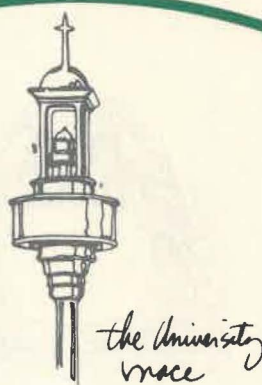
Academic Robes and Regalia

The pagentry and color of an academic convocation such as today's inauguration come to us from medieval times when academic robes and regalia were adapted from ecclesiastical garb. Most robes were black to symbolize the democracy of scholarship, since they cover any dress or rank of social standing worn beneath. Bachelors' gowns are cut with long pointed sleeves; masters' gowns feature closed slit sleeves and doctors' gowns are full-cut with double-belled sleeves and bars of velvet trim. Some universities have authorized doctoral gowns in a single color representative of the institution, such as Harvard's crimson and the University of Chicago's maroon.

The hood, originally a simple cowl attached to the gown, bears the heaviest symbolism of the academic costume. Its lining displays the colors of the university which granted the degree, and the bordering color indicates the field of learning (or faculty) in which the degree was earned. The square cap, or mortarboard, originated in the 13th Century at the University of Paris and came to England in Tudor times. Earlier caps were round and reserved for doctoral degree holders. This velvet cap is still worn by doctors, except those with degrees in theology. Doctoral tassels are usually gold and other degrees are represented by black, but in recent years tassels have come to match the lining of the hood to indicate the field of learning.

The Mace

During the Middle Ages, the wood mace clad in metal was an effective weapon in battle, but as newer and more powerful military arms developed, it was transformed into a symbol of authority.

The earliest ceremonial maces were borne by bodyguards of 12th century English and French kings; by the end of the 16th century, they were used widely by officials of English cities and towns. Today the use of the ceremonial mace is found in the British Houses of Parliament, carried before ecclesiastical dignitaries and in university convocations such as this.

The Illinois Wesleyan University Mace was first carried at the 1969 inauguration of Dr. Robert S. Eckley as fifteenth president of the University. This striking symbol of the institution, created by a School of Art professor, is made of bronze for power and endurance and of walnut for organic strength.

At the top, the cupola represents the bell tower of Old North Hall, Wesleyan's original building. It was erected in 1856 and demolished in 1967 to make way for the construction of Sheean Library. The bell suggests the Hedding Bell, a campus landmark since 1931 when it was installed at IWU after peeling for generations at Hedding College. Together, the cupola and bell symbolize the union of Illinois Wesleyan and Hedding in 1930.

The staff of the Mace is carved from the walnut of Old North, and the names of the University's presidents are engraved on its cylindrical base in chronological order.

The Medallion

Used since antiquity as symbols of momentous events as well as affiliations with groups and associations, medallions were important in medieval times as symbols of membership in religious orders and guilds. As part of academic regalia, they may be struck for both ceremonial and commemorative uses.

The sterling silver medallion plated in gold in today's presidential investiture was first worn by IWU's fourteenth president, Dr. Lloyd M. Bertholf, at the 1966 Commencement. A gift from the Alumni Association, the emblem of office is a reproduction of the University seal designed in 1866 by two faculty members. Each of the lower links of the chain bears the name of an Illinois Wesleyan president with the date of his tenure. These links, in chronological order, move up both sides of the chain from the body of the medallion itself.
