As our new international students were preparing to come to Illinois Wesleyan, IWU study abroad students were preparing for their own education abroad.

This fall sees 60 students setting out for a semester or year of studying abroad. Seventeen students will be living and studying in London with Professor Scott Sheridan as part of the IWU London program. One student will set out for a year as a Visiting Student at Oxford University's Pembroke College. The others will be studying with our affiliates in 21 countries around the world and this fall also sees us sending our first student to Madagascar!

And welcome back to our returning study abroad students!

Rejoining us are 79 study abroaders—58 of whom studied abroad during the spring, one for the full academic year, and 20 during the summer. They studied in over 15 countries on 5 continents from Australia to Russia, Ghana to New Zealand.

Featured Study Abroad Program

CIEE's program in Hyderabad, India: The World's Largest Democracy

Hyderabad, the fifth largest city in India, provides students the ability to grasp the historic and cultural density of the largest democracy in the world. Students will study the impact of modernity upon tradition through courses in history, literature, philosophy, and sociology.

Situated between northern and southern India, Hyderabad's location ensures that students gain insight into the linguistic, religious, and cultural diversity of the region.

To become immersed into Indian culture, CIEE provides a customized orientation and cultural activities in Hyderabad and Mysore, group excursions to other cities, and yoga classes at the Yoga center on campus; meditation along with music and dance classes conducted by experts in the field. Students will study at the University of Hyderabad, located approximately 30-45 minutes from the downtown area by public transportation affording students a more tranquil environment outside of the city center to learn about student life in Andhra Pradesh.

With this program, students have the choice of three housing options: guest houses, university dorms, or homestays.

The academic program is offered in collaboration with the Study India Program (SIP) at the University of Hyderabad. The SIP provides international students the opportunity to study various aspects of Indian society, history, culture, and creates an international education model.

Saturday in the City: Chicago Goes International IWU International Students and Alums Explore the City and Each Others' Cultures

On February 23, 2008, over 20 IWU international students boarded a coach to Chicago for "Saturday in the City," a day-long excursion that paired students with IWU alumni.

After listening to international students talk during Homecoming about their experiences crossing cultures, IWU alumna Marianne Wolf-Astrauskas ('76) proposed the event as a way to bridge cultures and forge friendships.

"I was particularly struck with their comments [at homecoming] about the foods they miss from home, how long it would be before they would have the comfort of encouraging words from their parents and families and the undeniable truth that they are so alone even in their group," Wolf-Astrauskas said.

For the February event, 16

alumni joined the students, showing them around the city and introducing them to the history, culture, and cuisine of Chicago. Students toured the Loop, explored Millennium Park and the Art Institute, and visited the Sears Skydeck.

And the international students, too, did some sharing: one group took alums to a Chinese restaurant, where the current students introduced their guests to traditional dishes. "I had the treat of sampling Chinese dishes I probably never would have attempted if not for the explanation of the students," Wolf-Astrauskas said. "Though my lips were numb from the spices, we had a great time."

Funding Your Study Abroad Experience

Study abroad can be affordable!

While spending a semester studying in another country will be more costly than staying in Blooming-Normal for four months, remember that all of your federal, state, and IWU financial aid (except work-study) can be applied to the tuition costs. Moreover, there are additional sources of aid available specifically for studying abroad.

Indeed, students studying abroad this fall received a combined total of over \$17,000 in additional aid, with awards ranging from \$750 to \$5000!

All of our affiliated study abroad providers have scholarship programs. Some of their scholarships are need based, some are merit based, and some are geographically specific, but all provide an excellent place to look for funding opportunities.

There are also some national study abroad scholarship programs. Among them are the following:

Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarships

offers up to \$5000 to help students with high financial need (those receiving Pell Grants) to study abroad. An additional \$3000 is available to students who study a critical-need language.

The Freeman Asia Program offers up to\$5000 for study in East/Southeast Asia.



Phi Kappa Phi Study Abroad Grants provide \$1000 for study abroad.

The National Security Education Program (NSEP)

funds study abroad in regions of critical interest to the United States. Awards range from \$8000 for summer study to \$20,000 for a full academic year.

Study abroad is one of the most valuable experiences you can gain while in college. And with a bit of extra work on your part, it can become a reality!
