His Excellency, Gonzalo Sánchez de Lozada

President of the Republic of Bolivia

His Excellency, Gonzalo Sánchez de Lozada is currently serving his second five-year term as president of the Republic of Bolivia. President Sánchez de Lozada won the June 2002 elections by a relative majority that was confirmed by a vote in Congress on August 5, 2002. In his inaugural address, he called for unity in order to help Bolivia confront the economic crisis spreading through the region.

Born in La Paz, Bolivia, President Sánchez de Lozada was raised and educated in the United States. His father taught political science at Harvard University, and Mr. Sánchez de Lozada attended the University of Chicago, graduating in 1952 with a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy and English literature.

The year after his graduation, he founded a documentary and commercial film production company, which he managed until 1957 when he started a petroleum services company. In 1962, he founded Compañía Minera del Sur (COMSUR), a mining enterprise dedicated to the production of tin, silver, gold, lead, and zinc. Today, COMSUR is the largest mining company in Bolivia. Known in Bolivia simply as "Goni," President Sánchez de Lozada first entered public life as a member of Congress in 1979. He served in several leadership positions, including President of the Senate, and played a key role in stopping hyperinflation. In 1985, he co-authored the economic "shock therapy" program, which opened Bolivia to international trade, made radical reforms that brought about economic stabilization, and created the foundation for future economic growth.

In 1989 he was the presidential candidate for the Movimiento Nacionalista Revolucionario (MNR) and won the election by a relative majority, but a run-off in Congress turned the presidency over to the candidate who placed third. From 1989 to 1993, he was head of the MNR party and was elected as the party's presidential candidate. He ran again in the 1993 general elections and won by a substantial although relative majority that was ratified by the congressional vote. Mr. Sánchez de Lozada served as the 61st president of Bolivia from 1993 to 1997. A right-wing pro-market reformer, he implemented the "Plan de Todos" (A Plan for Everyone), which was based on profound economic, social and political reforms. Term limits prevented him from running for a consecutive term, but he was re-elected for a five-year term in his second bid for the presidency in August 2002.

A 2002 *Washington Post* article reported that President Sánchez de Lozada described his current presidency as "a second marriage, with the victor of hope over experience." When President Sánchez de Lozada received the Alumni Medal from the University of Chicago's Alumni Association in 2001, the former U.S. ambassador to Bolivia praised him, saying: "Brilliantly successful in his own country, he is admired by the leaders of economic and social reform throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. If there were a free-agency market in presidents, he would be at least president of Argentina, if not Brazil and Mexico."

President Sánchez de Lozada was a member of the Americas Society/Council of the Americas of New York for many years and currently is a member of the Leadership Council for Inter-American Summitry of the North-South Center of the University of Miami. He is Chairman of the Board of the Foundation of the Americas and the Inter-American Dialogue in Washington D.C. President Sánchez de Lozada holds honorary degrees and awards from numerous institutions, including the University of Boston, the universities of Senshu and Kyoto in Japan, the Institute of the Americas, and the Universidad San Francisco de Quito in Ecuador. He will receive the decree Doctor of Laws, honoris causa, from Illinois Wesleyan.

President Sánchez de Lozada is married to Ximena Iturralde Monje, and they have a daughter and a son and four grandchildren.

Elizabeth is a music education major from Tinley Park, Illinois. She has studied piano for twelve years. She is also a vocalist and a percussionist.

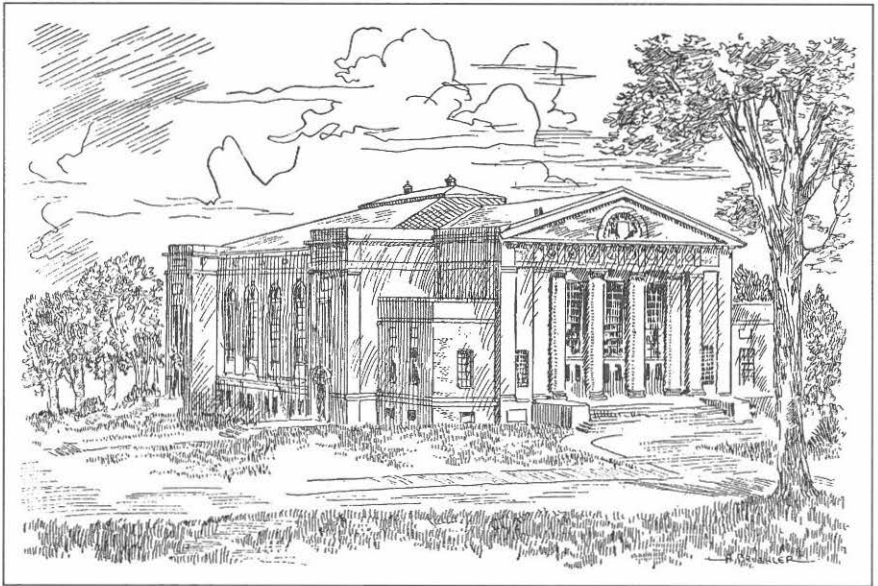
Emma Wear
