Eboo Patel

Prominent leader in the movement for interfaith cooperation

Founder and President of Interfaith Youth Core (IFYC)

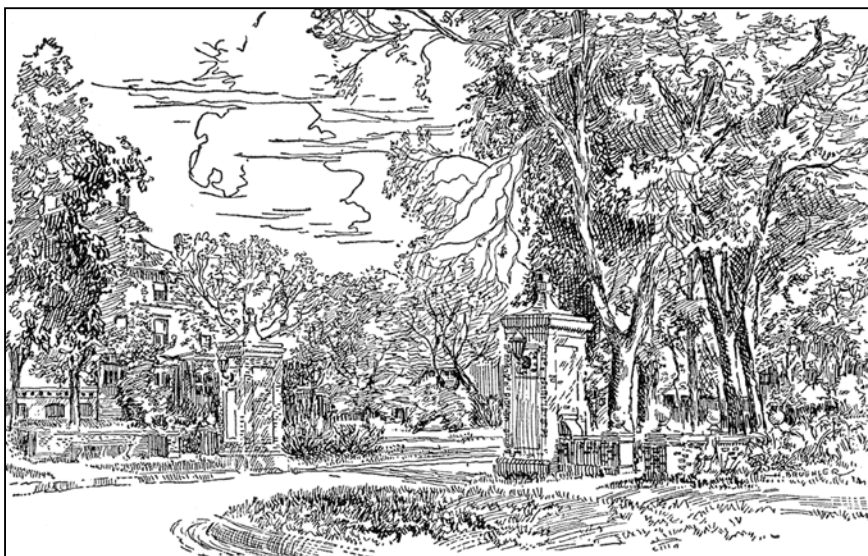


Eboo Patel is a leader at the forefront of the movement for cooperation among different religious faiths and backgrounds. He is the founder and president of Interfaith Youth Core (IFYC), a national nonprofit organization that works to make interfaith cooperation a social norm. IFYC, based in Chicago, works with higher education institutions to help realize a future where religion is a bridge of cooperation rather than a barrier of division.

Raised in Glen Ellyn, a Chicago suburb, Dr. Patel holds a doctorate in the sociology of religion from Oxford University, where he studied on a Rhodes scholarship. Named by *U.S. News & World Report* as one of America's Best Leaders of 2009, Dr. Patel served on President Barack Obama's Inaugural Faith Council. Dr. Patel wrote the book *Acts of Faith* (Beacon Press, 2010), his account of growing up as a Muslim in the United States and his process of coming to believe in religious pluralism. *Acts of Faith* won the Louisville Grawemeyer Award in Religion, which honors highly significant contributions to religious and spiritual understanding. Dr. Patel is also the author of *Sacred Ground: Pluralism, Prejudice, and the Promise of America* (Beacon Press, 2013) and the forthcoming publication *Interfaith Leadership: A Primer*.

Dr. Patel regularly contributes to the public conversation regarding religion in the United States. His work has been featured in the *Washington Post*, *USA Today*, *Huffington Post*, *NPR*, and *CNN*. He is a frequent speaker and guest lecturer at colleges and universities across the United States, bringing his message on the topic of religious pluralism to young adults. He has also spoken at events such as the Clinton Global Initiative, the Nobel Peace Prize Forum, and as a Young Global Leader at the World Economic Forum.
