- Literature Analysis: List theme techniques used (Ryan & Bernard, 2003)




Figure 1: Conceptual Framework

Literature Review

Movement/Dance:

- Complementing the core curriculum with dance allows students to develop nonverbal communication skills (Koff, 2000).
- Incorporating movement engages students in the thinking process kinesthetically (Skoning, 2008).
- Utilizing movement in a meaningful way develops creativity, communication, and critical thinking in students (Becker, 2013).

Visual Arts:

- The meaningful integration of visual arts and sustained creativity have positive impacts on student 's self-efficacy (Catterall & Peppler, 2007).
- Creativity is not developed naturally. Teachers must create an environment that supports its development. (Pavlou, 2013).
- Not only do visual arts connect to the development of literacy but the links between art and science are natural and often overlooked (Andrzejczk, Poldberg, & Trainin, 2013).

Theater/Drama:

- Creative drama is a teaching tool that promotes student collaboration and understanding not memorization (Eick, Hendrix, & Shannon, 2012).
- Using theater arts allows students to take ownership of their learning (inoa, Tabone, & Weltsek, 2014).
- Subjects like math and science are often dry and students lack interest. The creativity of drama contrasts this view (Ng & Nicholas, 2008).
- The performance of drama has the ability to develop students' reading fluency (Young, 2014).

Creative Writing:

- Develop a space for writing where students are in control (Menmuir, 2011).
- Children gain independence and autonomy when allowed to choose their writing topics (Ryan, 2014).
- Creative writing develops students imagination, and increases confidence and writing ability (Akkaya, 2010).

Results

- Amongst various strategies, research showed consistent benefits in student learning and increased peer collaboration.
- Class environments that encourage creativity are essential.
- Teaching strategies can be easily and widely integrated.
- Strategies benefit all types of learners, primarily kinesthetic.
- Classroom environments with high emphasis on student voice increased interests in subject areas.
