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IWU Professor to Speak on African-American Women Composers

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
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IWU Professor to Speak on African-American Women Composers February 1, 2006

BLOOMINGTON, Ill. - Carren Moham, associate professor of voice at Illinois Wesleyan University will give a talk titled "African-American Women Composers: Making Beautiful Music Through Discrimination, Trials, and Tribulations," as part of the second annual Women's Studies Faculty Colloquia on Wednesday, Feb. 8, at 7 p.m. in the Evelyn Chapel (1301 Park St., Bloomington).
