Her goal, she writes, is to use the expressive arts to demonstrate to people "how to observe and interpret their own internal images, [and to use the] findings to make relevant changes in their lives — [in order to] achieve peace of mind and bring balance to their personal sphere."

Lakota has been an occupational therapist at OSF Medical Center in Peoria for over 30 years. Much of her attention in the past has focused on adolescent behavioral health. She serves on the Board of Directors for the Seven Circles Heritage Foundation, located in Edwards, Ill. The purpose of the foundation is to promote Native American dance, arts, and cultural values in the broader community, as well as to promote the traditions of many other cultures.

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
