Background: Guest speaker Jeffrey J. Kripal, a Lynette S. Autry associate professor of

religious studies at Rice University, Texas, got his Ph.D from the

University of Chicago. He has published many research works concerning religion, including "Kali's Child: The Mystical and the Erotic in the Life and Teachings of Ramakrishna," which won the American Academy of Religion History of Religions Prize, and "Roads of Excess: Palaces of Wisdom." Senior religion majors at Illinois Wesleyan read the latter in

this year's senior seminar course.

Kripal was chosen to speak by the Religion Department because of his impressive background in religious studies. As the speech's title reflects, he will address the comic and movie "X-Men," as well as touch on the powers that religion instructors have and the ethics of studying religion in

relationship to world events.

Program: This final colloquium on religion for the 2003-04 school year will begin

after the senior religion majors present the conclusions of their research projects. Research topics were chosen by each student and range from Tibetan Buddhism, eucharistic traditions in early Christian communities, and the spiritualist movement in the late 19th century, to social memory

and the war in Iraq.
