Illinois Wesleyan Names 12 Freshmen Presidential Scholars

BLOOMINGTON, Ill.—Anna Gullickson of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, (George Washington Senior H.S.) is among a dozen freshmen honored today (Sept. 11) as Presidential Scholars at Illinois Wesleyan University.

Gullickson, a National Merit Scholar, is majoring in vocal performance. She has had roles ranging from Maria in the *Sound of Music* to Madame Arcati in *Blythe Spirit*.

Among Gullickson's interests are opera, French, psychology, and journalism.

As a high school student, Gullickson won several music awards, including Best Vocalist and Most Dedicated, as well as a Social Studies Award. She served as secretary of the Vivace Swing Choir, secretary of Momentum, and vice president of the Concert Choir. Gullickson is a member of the National Honor Society. Among high school activities that she participated in were soccer, cross country, Thespians, and French Club. Gullickson also appeared in stage productions of *Damn Yankees* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. She headed the costume crew for a production of *Amadeus*.

The Presidential Scholars' Program, established in 1978, recognizes a group of entering freshmen distinguished for their past achievements and future promise. They are students who have taken on many challenges in and out of the classroom. Selections for the academic honor are based on personal interviews and application materials.

Nine of this year's dozen Presidential Scholars also are National Merit Scholars. As a group, the Presidential Scholars averaged 1457 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), a major college entrance test with a perfect score of 1600.

Gullickson received her Presidential Scholar honor at IWU's President's Convocation, a campus-wide gathering marking the start of the academic year.

International Olympic Committee (IOC) member Anita DeFrantz addressed the President's Convocation and received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. DeFrantz, president of the Amateur Athletic Foundation and an attorney, won a bronze medal in rowing at the 1976 Montreal games. The *Sporting News*, the weekly newspaper, has called DeFrantz one of the 100 most powerful women in sports and *The Australian Magazine* this year ranked her among the 100 most powerful women in the world. DeFrantz played a pivotal role in Atlanta securing this year's summer Olympic games and Salt Lake City hosting the 2002 winter Olympics. The *Wall Street*

Journal in a profile of Defrantz last June reported she is the only woman on the 11-member IOC Executive Committee and the first black woman elected to the body.

Anna is the daughter of Marc and Cathy Gullickson, 3604 Honeyhill Dr., S.E., Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

IWU, founded in 1850, enrolls about 1,900 students in a College of Liberal Arts, College of Fine Arts, and a four-year professional School of Nursing. A \$15 million athletics and recreation center opened in the fall of 1994; and a \$25 million science building opened in the fall of 1995. The Carnegie Commission for the Advancement of Teaching promoted Illinois Wesleyan to a "Baccalaureate I" institution in 1994, a classification that places it among 161 highly selective National Liberal Arts Colleges in the annual *U.S. News & World Report* rankings. *Barron's Profiles of American Colleges*, another respected college guide, rated IWU "highly competitive (+)" in its latest edition.
