BLOOMINGTON, Ill. -- Illinois Wesleyan University junior Mary Etta Eastin was named winner of the 1998 Clockwatch Review Prize for Short Fiction.

Eastin, a junior art major from **Aledo** (**HS**), will receive a certificate and \$100 as her prize, which is offered each year to encourage up-and-coming writers. The prize is sponsored by the Clockwatch Review, the award-winning literary journal, and the IWU English department.

In selecting Eastin's story from the 10 entries received, contest judge Elaine Fowler Palencia said, "The narrator of Eastin's 'Soliloquy' portrays his struggling family and their defining milieu with such authority and troubled sensitivity that they continue to live as flesh and blood long after we have laid the story aside."

Palencia is the author of the books "Small Caucasian Women" and "Taking the Train."

Honorable mention awards of certificates and subscriptions to Clockwatch Review went to Peter Birk, a junior English major from Bloomington (Decatur Eisenhower HS), and to Adam Oldaker, a junior theatre arts major from Homewood (Marian Catholic HS).
