Rico McNeela, assistant professor of violin at Illinois Wesleyan University, will present a faculty recital at 8 p.m. Saturday, Mar. 14, in Westbrook Auditorium of Presser Hall.

The program, which will be open free to the public, will feature compositions by Bach, Chausson, Wieniawski and Franck. He will be assisted by Lawrence Campbell, piano.

McNeela came to Wesleyan this year from Allegheny College, Meadville, Pa., where he was concertmaster and assistant conductor of the Allegheny Civic Symphony.

McNeela earned a master's degree from his alma mater, the University of Michigan. He also studied at the Cleveland Institute of Music and studied privately with Paul Makanowitzky.
