Dr. James Whitehurst of the department of religion faculty at Illinois Wesleyan University will present his new multimedia program, "The Clown Within," for the university's weekly chapel service at 11 a.m. Wednesday (Feb. 8).

The program, which will be open free to the public, has been moved from its usual place, Presser Hall, to the main lounge of Memorial Student Center.

Ten projectors will be used for the program. Whitehurst will dress as a clown, perform stunts and magic, lead sing-alongs and display cartoons to get across his message: the hidden clown within each of us.

At 7 p.m. Wednesday, Whitehurst will present another of his multimedia productions, "Eye on Africa," in the main lounge of the center. It will be presented in conjunction with his course, "Varieties of Religious Experience," but will be open to the public. The program explores the historic, cultural and religious dimensions of progress and change in Africa.
