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Immediate Release : James McGowan Drawn High Praise for Translation of 66 Poems

BLOOMINGTON, ILL.--Illinois Wesleyan University English Professor Dr. James D. McGowan has drawn high praise for his recent translation of 66 poems from Charles Baudelaire's "Les Fleurs du Mal" (The Flowers of Evil).

Richard Berchan, University of Utah, called the translations "a new high standard of imaginative excellence and inventive fidelity."

Frank Jones, University of Washington, noted "the main thing is to catch the spirit of the original and still be faithful to its matter. This has now been achieved-at last-- in the case of Baudelaire."

The book, illustrated with woodcuts by Fred Brian, IWU professor of art, emeritus, and published by Spoon River Poetry Press, Peoria, contains French text on the left and the English translation on the right.

Baudelaire was a French poet and critic who died in 1867 at the age of 46.

McGowan, who has previously published a volume of original poems, began translating from German, Spanish and French about five years ago and became fascinated with the medium. He uses some of his translations in his upper-level Humanities courses.

Eastern educated at Middlebury College and Rutgers, McGowan joined the Wesleyan faculty in 1969.
