BLOOMINGTON, ILL.--The fifth annual Phi Kappa Phi Athenaeum lecture series at Illinois Wesleyan University will feature Joseph H. Meyers, retired associate professor of humanities, Wednesday, Nov. 13.

The program, which will be open free to the public, will be at 4 p.m. in the Davidson Room of Memorial Student Center. A reception will follow.

Meyers' topic will be "Books That Might Have Been."

The lecture series is sponsored by the Wesleyan chapter of Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary.

Meyers, who retired in 1972 after 19 years on the faculty, was named Century Club Honoree in 1965. A graduate of Xavier University, he holds a master's degree from Princeton. Prior to coming to Wesleyan in 1953, he taught at Purdue University and at Xavier.
