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Immediate Release : Dr. Huseman, Dr. Heyl, and Dr. Story Awarded \$3,000 Grants

Dr. Sue Ann Huseman, Dr. John D. Heyl and Dr. Geoffrey L. Story, all of the Illinois Wesleyan University faculty, have been awarded \$3,000 grants by the National Endowment for the Humanities to participate in Summer Seminars for College Teachers.

The seminars are eight weeks in length and are conducted by leading authorities in various fields at universities where major libraries are available for research. Participation is limited to 12 persons each and participants also undertake individual research aside from the class work.

Ms. Huseman will go to Brown University, Providence, R.I., June 23-Aug. 15, for "Woman and Representation in Nineteenth-Century Fiction," which will be conducted by Dr. Naomi Schor of the French faculty at Brown.

Her research will involve analysis of female-authored love quest literature to determine whether the narrative pattern, the treatment of the love quest theme and the representation of the romantic heroine differ significantly from previously analyzed male-authored literature.

Ms. Huseman is professor of French and Director of the Humanities Division at Wesleyan, where she has been a member of the faculty since 1969.

Heyl will be in New Orleans, La., June 15-Aug. 8 for "The Central American Crises in Historical Perspective," which will be headed by Dr. Ralph Lee Woodward, Jr., at Tulane University.

Heyl's research project will involve the roles that death and death-imagery are playing in the revolutionary process in Central American politics.

He is professor of history and Director of the Social Science Division. He joined the IWU faculty in 1969.

Story will take part in "The Early Christian World in Sociological Perspective," which will be conducted by Dr. Howard C. Kee of Boston University in Boston June 10-July 31.

Story's research will center on the apostle Paul and the Christian community at Corinth, using various texts and the New Testament books, I and II Corinthians.

Story, who joined the IWU faculty in 1965, is an associate professor of religion.

The National Endowment for the Humanities was created by Congress in 1965 to support research, teaching and learning in the humanities.

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
