BLOOMINGTON, ILL.--Sister Helen Carey, acting chaplain of Illinois Wesleyan University, will speak on "The Sign(s) of Our Lives" at the campus chapel service at 11:00 a.m. Wednesday in Evelyn Chapel.

Sister Carey is currently filling in as chaplain for the Rev. Dr. William L. White, who is on sabbatical. She also works with Wesleyan's campus ministry and teaches a course in Roman Catholic issues.

Sister Carey holds a doctorate in philosophy from Fordham, a master's degree in philosophy from St. Louis University, and a bachelor's degree in English from St. Scholastica College in Duluth, MN.

She is a former professor of philosophy at Centre College in Kentucky.

The Benedictine nun, shares a monastic tradition dating from the 6th century.

She came to Wesleyan in September 1985, in response to a shift in the school's student population. Since 1981 the university, which is affiliated with the United Methodist Church, has had more Roman Catholic students than Methodists.

Sister Carey is a member of her Diocese's Commission on the Role of Women in the Church. She is also a member of Benedictines for Peace, Pax Christi, and Bread for the World.
